## 2017 FAS Annual Meeting

## **Conference Hotel**


Shuttle services from the hotel are provided **ONLY** for the Friday night reception and the Saturday banquet. Pick up is in the front lobby of the hotel.







# Louis D. Tesar Historic Preservation Essay Contest

The Panhandle Archaeological Society at Tallahassee (PAST), a chapter of the Florida Anthropological Society (FAS), is holding an essay contest for a prize of \$1,000. Modeled after the FAS annual student paper competition, the essay contest is open to graduate and undergraduate students currently enrolled in a collegiate program in archaeology, history, or a related field. Students who wish to enter the contest must be enrolled in a college or university located in Florida or engaged in fieldwork in Florida.

Essays will address the question "What is the benefit of historic preservation and conservation of archaeological sites in Florida?" Essays will be 10-12 pages in length (plus references and images), and must be submitted by email to <a href="mailto:PASTessayContest@gmail.com">PASTessayContest@gmail.com</a> by Monday, January 15, 2018.

Top essay contestants will be asked to summarize their paper in a ten-minute oral presentation, to be given in Tallahassee during the June 5<sup>th</sup> meeting of PAST. A committee will judge the written essays and oral presentation

on: quality of arguments and supporting data, overall contribution to our understanding of historic preservation in Florida, and overall presentation. With permission of the authors, the winning essay will be published on the PAST web site.

# Documenting Deerhead Hammock (8BR03406)

While conducting our site file census, the Indian River Anthropological Society (IRAS), learned of a probable archaeological site, owned by the American Homesteading Foundation and located at the headwaters of Crane Creek in Brevard County. After seeking and obtaining permission to investigate the site, IRAS proceeded to test the mound. IRAS excavated three tests: one shovel test, a one meter square excavation on the mound, and one shovel test in a slough adjacent to the mound. Excavators avoided the highest part of the mound in order to prevent encountering burials.

Test excavation produced several sherds of St. Johns plain and numerous small faunal materials, some of which were burned. After determining the site was an

actual site was a site, IRAS applied for a Florida Master Site File number. Processing and analysis of the recovered material continues. The final report should be complete by the end of April 2017. Preliminary indications suggest the site was used as a temporary campsite.

# **SEFAS Celebrates FAM (with Style!)**

Southeast Florida Archaeology Society had a busy Florida Archaeology Month. First, they cohosted their first Down & Dirty Archaeology Fest on Sunday March 12th with the House of Refuge Museum at Gilbert's Bar.

The House of Refuge at Gilbert's Bar was built in 1876 to offer assistance to shipwreck survivors. It sits on an Ais Indian midden. It is the last of ten such houses built on Florida's east coast. The Houses of Refuge saw service under the Life-Saving Service (1876-1915), U.S. Coast Guard (1915-1945), and U.S. Navy during WWII. Purchased by Martin County, it opened as Martin County's first museum in 1956.



During the Archaeology Fest, there were hands-on demonstrations, including pottery sorting and identification. Children screened dirt and learned about stratigraphy and/or made their own shell necklaces and clay pots. A lecture by FPAN, "14000 Years of Florida Prehistory," was a big hit with the older crowd. Other organizations that participated included: Old Vero Ice Age Sites Committee, Lawrence E. Will Museum of the Glades, and PBCA. Spending a Sunday afternoon on the Atlantic Ocean learning about Florida Archaeology was great.



Theresa Schober presented "Evaluating Sedentism in the Late Archaic of Southeastern Florida: A View of Mount Elizabeth," at the SEFAS monthly meeting. Her findings resulted from the 2008-2009 archaeological excavations conducted at the site. Mount Elizabeth, a large Native American midden bordering the Indian River Lagoon, is located in Indian Riverside Park, Martin County. Due to the installation of an elevator shaft, Schober was able to excavate over 16 feet deep, to the bottom of the midden, which revealed earth and shell deposits dating back at least 4,500 years. In 2012, a grass roots effort of individuals, SEFAS, and Friends of Mount Elizabeth generated funds to cover a detailed study of the recovered archaeological materials. Mount Elizabeth has been stabilized by Martin County and SEFAS dedicated a Historical Marker at the site in 2013.

# Thomas Penders wins Rare Life Devotion Award

At these events, children on the autism spectrum and their families walk the grounds of an actual archaeological site and enjoy a wide range of activities archaeology related to and paleontology, live music, face-painting, and much more. Participants use social skills, and use various functional skills, all while having fun. The entire event is free to

all registrants. Now in its fourth year, the program has helped enrich hundreds of lives.

"This financial award will help us to continue and perhaps expand our events, and to raise awareness for the need to find activities that these children can enjoy and learn from with their families," said Penders. "Thanks to Eagle Rare for this program of recognition. It has helped many."
