


#### River Cruise seats still available!

Join archaeologist, Gary Ellis of the Gulf Archaeological Research Institute (also GARI), aboard the *Plantation Adventure Center's* large capacity pontoon boat. This scenic boat tour will depart from *Plantation on Crystal River* at 9:30am en route for Shell Island at the river's mouth.



The tour will motor past the famous Crystal River Archaeological State Park, Roberts Island, and Wash Island, a few of the more interesting archaeological sites along the way. Duration of tour will be approximately 2 to 2.5 hours.

She has worked in cultural resource management throughout the Southeastern United States and created numerous outreach tools including videos, activities and museum displays. She currently works as a Public Archaeology Coordinator for the Florida Public Archaeology Network Northeast Region. Her interests include Florida's prehistoric archaeology, historic cemeteries and public archaeology and interpretation. She has served FAS as 1<sup>st</sup> VP and 2<sup>nd</sup> VP, each for two years.

First Vice President, <u>Dr. George Luer</u> – George has been a member of the Florida Anthropological Society for more than 45 years.
