RIPLEY P. BULLEN MEMORIAL AWARD

The recipient must be a professional archaeologist who has made contributions that improve the relationships between professional and avocational archaeologists.

THE WILLIAM C. LAZARUS AWARD

The recipient must not be a person who makes their living in the field of anthropology/archaeology. The Lazarus Award recognizes individuals who make significant contributions to historic preservation in Florida.

ARTHUR R. LEE CHAPTER AWARD

This Award recognizes a Chapter of the Florida Anthropological Society for excellence in education and cultural historic preservation.

STUDENT AWARDS

THE DOROTHY MOORE STUDENT GRANT

FAS awards \$500 annually to archaeology students (B.A., M.A., or Ph.D.) who are currently enrolled in a Florida university. The grant money will assist students conducting archaeological research in Florida. Grant funds can be used to cover the costs associated with archaeological fieldwork, special analyses (e.g., radiocarbon dates, faunal or botanical analyses, soils analysis, etc.), and, in some cases, travel expenses associated with presenting a paper based on the student's research at a professional meeting.

Students interested in applying for the grant should submit a letter, not to exceed two pages, that describes the project for which the funds are being requested; what research question(s) or problem(s) are being addressed; how the funds will be applied to these problems; what, if any, additional funds will be used to accomplish the research; and how the research will contribute to Florida archaeology. The applicant should include a budget indicating the amount requested and describing how the money will be spent along with a letter(s) of support from faculty. EBSCO and The Florida Anthropologist!

Beginning in March 2022, with Volume 75, Number 1, the Florida Anthropological Society is partnering with institutional subscription vendor EBCSCO Information Systems to offer journal content to scholars doing research using keyword searches. This partnership limits shared journal content to the article level (not complete journals). This makes current content available around the world through EBSCO's popular "Academic Search Ultimate" service.

When researchers find an article using keyword searches, they are then directed to the FAS website (fasweb.org) for more information. There, they are presented with links to access electronic issues of the journal and special FAS Publications dating from 1947 through 2019. They are encouraged to become a member of FAS to gain access to post-2019 publications. The EBSCO-FAS partnership has already begun to benefit FAS. As soon as the academic year began this late summer 2022, new members from far flung locations have joined FAS!

Ceramic Figurines at Presidios Santa Rosa and San Miguel

One of the most surprising artifacts recovered from the last two early 18th century military installations, called presidios, in Spanish West Florida, Santa Rosa and San Miguel, are fragments of small ceramic figurines. These artifacts are extremely rare and are currently being researched and the results are intriguing This presentation will provide an overview of the presidio figurines, their history in Mexico, and an interpretation of when and why they were brought to Pensacola.

The Archaeology of Colonialism at Fort Mose: Forging Freedom Through Practice

Lori Lee, PhD, Associate Professor of Anthropology, Flagler College

Fort Mose was the first legally sanctioned free black community in North America. The Spanish governor of La Florida guaranteed the legal freedom of self-emancipated Africans and African Americans if they converted to Catholicism, built and occupied a fort on the frontier of St. Augustine, and fought against Spanish enemies, which they did very bravely.

Between Sea and Sky: Movement, Trade, and Urbanism in Ancient Oaxaca

Dr. Sarah "Stacy" B. Barber, Professor of Anthropology, University of Central Florida

In ancient Mexico, transportation technologies were limited to people's feet and to canoes: there were no beasts of burden or wheeled vehicles to help people move over the region's mountainous landscape. Using a mix of archaeology, ethnohistory, and geographical information science

(GIScience), it was possible to propose a transportation network for the southern Mexican region of Oaxaca. This network offers insight to questions regarding trade, conquest, and political organization in the pre-Hispanic period.



The Domus Romana, stylized as the Domvs Romana, is a ruined Roman-era house located on the boundary between Mdina and Rabat, Malta, which was accidentally discovered in 1881. Although very little remains from the house itself, the intricate mosaics which survived for centuries as well as the artifacts found within the remains are testimony enough of the original richness and story of this fantastic abode.


